TUESDAY 7:00am–9:15am

Habits of the Heart, Jonathan Moore

**Elective* (2 hours for Certificate, 3 hours for Bachelor's & LDP, 4 for Master's)

Each believer is called by God to worship through personal holiness. All believers must embrace sound doctrine and establish habits that undergird life and ministry. This course reveals the essential convictions regarding the role of sound doctrine in the lifelong pursuit of purity and wisdom.

Introduction to Historical Theology, Daniel Huffstutler | Andrew Matoke

**Required for Certificate & LDP* (2 hours for Certificate, 3 hours for Bachelor's & LDP, 4 for Master's)

This course seeks to understand the history and development of the Church's doctrinal teaching and to build a contemporary *didache*—an early church manual to establish believers in the essentials of the apostles' teaching.

TUESDAY 10:15am–12:30pm

Introduction to Biblical Theology, Jonathan Moore

**Required for all programmes* (2 hours for Certificate, 3 hours for Bachelor's & LDP, 4 for Master's)

This course seeks to understand the basic message of the Scriptures and the major motifs of both Testaments, which will form the basis for developing a lifeview that is consistent with God's plan and purposes.

Interpreting 2, Jeremy Pittsley

**Elective* (2 hours for Certificate, 3 hours for Bachelor's & LDP, 4 for Master's)

The overall objective of this course is to develop the ability to skillfully use Hebrew and Greek in the interpreting, preaching and teaching of the Word, using the advancement of linguistics and computer technology, as a foundation for the lifelong process of learning the languages themselves.

THURSDAY 7:00am–9:25pm

Old Testament Theology: Latter Prophets, Jeremy Pittsley

**Required for Theology programmes* (3 hours for Bachelor's & LDP / 4 for Master's)

***Prerequisites: Interpretation 1*

This course is designed to lay the foundation for a lifetime of work in the Latter Prophets (i.e. Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, and "The 12" Minor Prophets). The student will be introduced to all of the essential processes and resources necessary to create a biblical theology of the Latter Prophets and to the process of moving from a biblical theology of those books to theology in culture.

THURSDAY 9:45am–12:15pm

Systematic Theology 1, Jonathan Moore

*(3 hours for Bachelor's & LDP, 4 for Master's)

This course is intended to help students develop a thoroughly integrated and systematic biblical worldview. Church ministry demands an understanding of the faith free from self-contradiction and presented in an organized fashion. Every participant will gain a broad overview and understanding of the teaching of the entire Bible on various central topics and will be able to answer the ultimate questions in our culture, addressing doctrinal aberrancies and anomalies in local, 21st century ministry.

SATURDAY 8:00am–1:30pm (meets monthly)

Life & Ministry Development: EABST Orientation, Philip Mwaniki & Jonathan Moore

*Required for all students (6 hours)

This course is designed to introduce all new students to EABST's foundational philosophy of education and ministry. Topics include church-based theological education, discipleship and mentorship, lifelong development planning, socratic discussions, and ministry/teaching practicums. Projects include discovering your GIDE (God-Intended Design and Endowments), completing your PDP (Personal Development Plan), and undergoing mentor Assessments.

2018 Inter-Term 1 Schedule of Courses Offered

4th June – 15th June, 2018

4th - 15th of June | WEEKDAYS ONLY, 7:00am–9:30am (2.5 hours per day; all week)

Text To Exposition Practicum Class: Ecclesiastes, Jeremy Pittsley

*One credit hour is earned for total hours of related labor including: preparation, experience, class time, reflection, and reporting. (Certificate requires 20 work hours; LDP: 35 hours; Bachelor's: 45 hours; Master's: 60).

This course is designed to hone the student's skills in interpreting and applying the Bible. The class will collaboratively practice the methods learned in Interpreting 1 to extract the author's intention in a single biblical book and create lessons that communicate that book's message to the 21st century.

2018 Inter-Term 2 Schedule of Courses Offered

2nd July – 13th July, 2018

2nd - 6th of July | MONDAY - FRIDAY, 8:00am–4:00pm

History of Christianity in Africa, A.D. 100 to the Present, Jeff Straub, Ph. D.

* (3 hours for Bachelor's & LDP, 4 for Master's)

A survey of the planting, expansion and growth of the Christian movement from the days of the Apostles to today. A major focus of the discussion will be on examining the Christian theological diversity across contemporary Africa tracing its roots and growth.

9th - 13th of July | MONDAY - FRIDAY, 8:00am–4:00pm

Apologetics, Cults, and Contemp. Religions, Vincent Kajuma

* (3 hours for Bachelor's & LDP, 4 for Master's)

This course is designed to equip students to identify and competently respond to cults, false religions and non-Christian worldviews. The student will be helped to appreciate that part of the gospel ministry is to defend the gospel from the challenges posed by false teaching. Topics include: The Biblical Basis for Apologetics; Essential Doctrines of the Christian Faith; Developing Biblical Discernment; Foreign Cults; Local Cults.

TUESDAY 7:00am–9:15am

Life & Ministry Development: EABST Orientation, Philip Mwaniki & Jonathan Moore

**Required for all students (6 hours)*

This course is designed to introduce all new students to EABST's foundational philosophy of education and ministry. Topics include church-based theological education, discipleship and mentorship, lifelong development planning, socratic discussions, and ministry/teaching practicums. Projects include discovering your GIDE (God-Intended Design and Endowments), completing your PDP (Personal Development Plan), and undergoing mentor Assessments.

Church Life — God's Pattern for Healthy Churches, Jeremy Pittsley

**Required for All programmes (2 hours for Certificate, 3 hours for Bachelor's & LDP, 4 for Master's)*

This course provides an overview of the biblical pattern and expectation of behaviors for all church members and leaders that will produce God-honoring, biblically ordered, self-replicating churches.

TUESDAY 10:15am–12:30pm

Shepherding and Counseling, Jonathan Moore

**Required for all ministry programmes (3 hours for Bachelor's & LDP / 4 for Master's)*

This course builds a comprehensive shepherding strategy for a church that is drawn from the Scriptures, especially from Paul's early letters, rather than the secular psychological care paradigm of contemporary culture. It will help students develop an understanding of the biblical model of pastoral care that was practiced in the early churches. This will form the basis for developing a philosophy of pastoral care that is consistent with New Testament guidelines for living in community and treating problems in our own lives and in our churches.

Ministry Perspectives: Conflicts Without, Fears Within, Jeremy Pittsley

**Elective (3 hours for Bachelor's & LDP / 4 for Master's)*

Develop a biblical perspective of life and ministry as the guiding force for standing firm in the ministry, skillfully and resolutely addressing the problems and problem people within the church.

WEDNESDAY 7:00am–9:30am

Interpreting 1, Andrew Matoke & Jonathan Moore

**Required for all programmes (3 hours for Bachelor's & LDP / 4 for Master's)*

The course will provide instruction and application of the interpretive skills required to identify the author's intention for writing, as it is expressed in the text, providing the final determinant of meaning.

The overall objective of this course is to determine the fundamental biblical principles regarding the mission of the church and its role in missions, developing guidelines and strategy from these principles for a local church's involvement.

THURSDAY 7:00am–9:30am

New Testament Theology: Johannine, Jeremy Pittsley

**Required for theology programmes (3 hours for Bachelor's & LDP / 4 for Master's)*

****Prerequisites: Interpretation 1**

This course is designed to lay the foundation for a lifetime of work in John's Gospel, letters, and the book of Revelation. The student will be introduced to all of the essential processes and resources necessary to create a biblical theology of these books and to the process of moving from biblical theology to theology in culture.

THURSDAY 9:45am–12:15pm

Teaching and Preaching, Jonathan Moore

**Required for LDP & Ministry programmes (Practicum: 2 hours)*

This practicum is designed to equip the student to understand and faithfully teach the Scriptures and to develop a commitment to expositional teaching that communicates the flow of thought of a biblical book and relates the big idea of a section of Scripture to the contemporary audience. The course culminates in the development and delivery of a short devotional message and a complete 30-minute message.

SATURDAY 8:00am–1:30pm (meets monthly)

Methods in Writing, Jeremy Pittsley

**Required for LDP, Bachelor's, and Master's programmes (Practicum: 2 hours)*

This practicum will guide the student into obtaining skills in well-informed, and well-reasoned theological composition that meets EABST's standards of clarity and precision. The course culminates with a theological research paper on "The Means of Assurance of Salvation," which will serve the student well in answering questions he will receive on this issue in future ministry.

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
